The journal comes out twice a year and is intended for an international audience. It is published both in print form and electronically as an open access publication. The language of the journal is English.

VTU Review is dedicated to publishing and disseminating innovative research in the humanities and social sciences. The disciplines covered by the journal are literary, cultural, and language studies, history, archaeology, sociology, political science, social psychology, and anthropology.

Each issue focuses on a special topic but also includes a *Varia* section, which contains articles unrelated to it. A book review section keeps readers informed of locally and internationally published books in the humanities and social sciences. Individual issues may include interviews with eminent writers, scholars, and social scientists, as well as forums on key developments in the disciplines covered by the journal.

VTU Review considers all submitted manuscripts on the condition that

- the manuscript is the author's/authors' own original work, and does not duplicate any other previously published work, including previously published work by the same author(s);
- the manuscript has been submitted only to *VTU Review*; it is not under consideration, or accepted for publication, or in press, or published elsewhere;
- the manuscript contains nothing that is abusive, defamatory, obscene, fraudulent, or illegal.
